## Jean Cocteau's romantic melodrama returns to the stage at Hostry Festival

A tale of passion, tragedy and intrigue is taking to the stage at Norwich's Hostry Festival this

French melodrama The Eagle Has Two Heads is the autumn arts extravaganza's central show, and the production, which opened on Monday, runs until Saturday.

Set in an Austrian castle in about 1910, the Jean Cocteau play sees a queen's would-be assassin fall hopelessly in love with her.

For a brief moment in time their love blooms - but it is not long before the corridors of power begin to echo with disapproval.

Stash Kirkbride, the director of the show and artistic director of the Hostry Festival, said the production gave audiences a unique chance to see the play which was first performed in Paris in the 1940s.

"It's a revival of a long lost French melodrama, a romantic play not seen in Norfolk since

"Audience members will enter the theatre space at the Hostry and they will be greeted by a huge 20ft by 15ft mural of the eagle with two heads that has been painted by artist Gennadiy V. Ivanov, and they will enjoy a highly charged evening of romantic melodrama.


They are joined by fellow cast members Peter Barrow, Lucy Monaghan, Christopher Neal and Tawa Groombridge.

The show is among a number of events taking place at Norwich Cathedral's Hostry this week as part of the festival.

Other events include a free screening of the 1948 film version of The Eagle Has Two Heads today, a musical event inspired by Julian of Norwich on Saturday, and actress Hayley Mills in conversation with Stash Kirkbride on Sunday.

## **Review:** The Eagle Has Two Heads

In The Eagle Has Two Heads, Jean Cocteau's gripping melodrama that is being performed every evening this week as part of the Hostry Festival at Norwich Cathedral, Tracey Catchpole is the star. The tragic widow of the assassinated king of some vague Balkan country, she appears in black first, then in red, finally in riding breeches. Will she now escape the reclusive life she has made for herself? Will she fall in love with romantic Stanislas (Adam Edwards), who plans to kill her?. She questions her feelings, holding the audience's attention as she expresses her passions and puzzlement in great speeches that tell of her dreams. But tragedy strikes
