Woman banned

A woman has been handed a two-year order banning her from parts of Norwich city centre, because of her persistent anti-social behaviour.

Sharon O'Hara, 47, of Barnards Yard in Norwich, appeared before magistrates in Norwich on Thursday charged with breaching the conditions of a community protection notice.

Magistrates imposed a two-year criminal behaviour order, which bans O'Hara from a number of places in the city

centre, including the Haymarket and various roads around it, except to go to the soup run between the hours of 7pm to 9pm each day.

She is also banned from entering the area of St Gregory's Green and will breach the order if she is drunk or in possession of an open container of alcohol within the inner ring road, except in the area where she lives.

The order would also be breached if she causes nuisance, annoyance, distress or alarm to the public.
